The UK is made up of four countries. These countries are split into regions and further divided into counties. All places have differences and share similarities with other places, but they also have a diversity of features within them that help make them special. The UK has people moving in and out all the time. People who move are those with the greatest mobility. They bring their skills to the country they move to.

Key Vocabulary

Region	A part of a country or the world.
County	An area within a country that runs services such as transport, education and policing.
Stereotype	A set idea that people might have about a person, place or thing, but which is often not true in reality.
Diversity	The variety of human, physical or cultural characteristics in a geographical area.
Abroad	Going to or being in a foreign country.
Emigration	Leaving your country to live in another one.
Immigration	Moving into a new country to live there.
Migration	Moving from one place to another with the intention of staying there.

Key Vocabulary

National Park	A large area of land that is protected by law for the benefit of the nation.
Natural Environment	A place that has not been changed by humans.
Landscape	An area and its landforms and features that can be seen when viewed from another place.
Erosion	The process of the Earth's surface, eg. rock or soil being worn away and transported from its original site.
Tectonic Plates	The huge pieces that Earth's crust is broken into are known as tectonic plates.
Climate	The long- term pattern of weather, usually taken over more than 30 years.
Tourism	People travelling to a different place from where they live for a holiday.
