Promenade	A pathway along the beach.

#### RNLI (Royal National Lifeboat Institution)

- Founded in 1824 by Sir William Hillary.
- A charity that saves lives at sea.
- 24/7 search and rescue lifeboat service.
- Run by volunteers and funded by voluntary donations.





A lighthouse is a tall building that has a light near the top. They are built on the coast of an ocean or lake. They protect ships from crashing into the shore by sending light out towards the sea. The light usually turns in a circle so that ships see a flashing light.
