Content and Sequencing

- ✓ EYFS Children enjoy joining in with songs. They learn how to follow a simple melody and are encouraged to imitate movements in response to music which introduces pulse and rhythm. They also begin to show feelings and thoughts through music.
- ✓ Years 1 and 2 Children start to learn how to play tuned and untuned instruments. They will
 listen to different music and begin commenting on the different musical elements. When singing,
 children will follow a melody, use simple rhythms and start exploring different dynamics.
- Years 3 and 4 In Lower Key Stage 2 children build on their work from years 1 and 2. They will start singing from memory with more expression and confidence. Performances will consist of both solos and ensembles. When listening to music, the children will be able to use some musical terminology to describe what they hear and explain what they like about it.
- ✓ Years 5 and 6 For our oldest children, they will continue to develop confidence in their
 performance skills. When listening to music across a wider range of genres throughout history,
 they will identify how moods and textures can be created. They will compose music for a specific
 purpose and have a greater understanding of music notation.
- ✓ All Years the common themes from our school pathway for music will be embedded across all year groups.
